Dear Friends,

It looks as if we are in this for the long haul – months and not weeks. Who knows what we will face at the end of it all? Whatever there will be no quick fix and virtues such as patience and fortitude will need to be asked for and practiced. I would encourage you to join us at Mass on YouTube: either in Tranent at 9.30am or Musselburgh at 11.30am. I also urge you to join in prayer at 7.00pm on Sunday evenings – even if only for 10 minutes you would be joining thousands across the UK praying at that time. I quote from the Churches Together in England Website:

'At 7pm this Sunday, light a candle in the windows of your homes as a visible symbol of the light of life, Jesus Christ, our source and hope in prayer. ... We have the great privilege and freedom to be able to call upon God, wherever we are, individually and corporately, for healing in our nation. We would pray for all in leadership at this time, making decisions about the containment of the COVID-19 virus, for those working in health and social care, and especially for the most vulnerable, whether elderly or those with underlying health conditions.

There are already stories being told of wonderful acts of kindness across neighbourhoods. Alongside your prayers, take the opportunity to telephone or email someone who is isolated, buy some additional food for your local foodbank, or offer to deliver shopping for an elderly neighbour. We may not be able to touch physically, but we can make connections in so many other ways.

I will post a short prayer time before the Blessed Sacrament at 7.00pm this Sunday. We will continue to post Sunday Mass, but other forms of prayer and meditation can be led by people in the congregations. For those of have Zoom or other online group facilities this can be done together. Why not consider it? I mention below Lectio Divina a form of meditative Bible reading which can be done together, or a rosary group or a simple prayer group. You will hear more of this in the coming weeks.

Homily Notes: The search for happiness:

What we now know for certain is that if you love somebody, what you long for more than anything else is that person's presence with you. Photos are a comfort. Telephone calls, emails and texts are nice. Letters are good. Skype and FaceTime are great ways to communicate. Yet nothing can compare to actually spending time with them in person. That's why this is a time of bereavement.

What our first parents lost through sin was not simply paradise but the presence of God. Even more than possessing the law, the distinguishing feature of Israel was God's presence with them. The temple was not primarily a place of sacrifice but a place of God's presence. Sin is a disaster because it not only isolates us from God and from one another, but it alienates us. That is even when presence is possible, we are uneasy and at worst hostile.

We are made to know God, just as we are known by him. The best way to know God, just as it is the best way to know another person, is to love him and let him love us. The path of Life is found by making ourselves available to this love. This Sunday's psalm: 'You will show me the path of life, the fullness of joy in your presence, at your right-hand happiness for ever.' Note also that the psalmist associates God's loving presence with life, joy and happiness.

As Catholics we will speak of God's real and substantial presence in the Eucharist above all in the Blessed Sacrament, the Lord is 'recognised in the breaking of bread'. However, the Lord is also present in the Scriptures. He is still able to address our lives; our hearts are still able to 'burn' as we listen to his voice as we travel along the road. For that to happen we personally need to engage in prayer, we need to ask the Risen Lord to open our minds and hearts to his word.

As you get a chance read though today's scripture passages, ask the Lord to be present to you and let him lead you on the path of life. To help you in this prayerful reading of the Scriptures I have attached a sheet entitled Lectio Divina. The paper speaks for itself but could also form the basis for a bible study/prayer group over Zoom.
